



At Saleema Noon Sexual Health Educators, we respectfully acknowledge that we are fortunate enough to live, work and play on the traditional and unceded Coast Salish territories, including the territories of the Sk̓wx̓wú7mesh (Squamish), səliiwətaʔt (Tseil-Waututh), and xʷməθkʷəy̓əm (Musqueam) First Nations. - We are committed to our ongoing learning as we actively participate in the anti-racist movement.
